COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE KINGSTON MARKETS. KINGSTON, June 29.—Butter is plentiful and can be bought at 17 to 18c per lb. Eggs are scarce and worth 15c per dozen. Lard 12 1/2c per lb, and cheese at 12 1/2c per lb. No change in the price of beef. Good cattle bring from 4 to 6c per lb. Butchers' stock is a cent lower. Lamb coming down in price. It can be bought at 50 to 80c per quarter. Chickens sell at 50 to 60c per pair; turkeys from \$1.50 to \$2 each. Ham is 14c per lb., and bacon from 13c to 14c per lb. Barrelled pork 9c per lb. Berries are in good demand, but the dry weather has cut off all hope of the prices being low. Last Saturday the vit could be secured at 7c per quart, but to-day 9 to 10c per quart was asked by the crate. Cherries and huckleberries 15c per quart, and raspberries 20c per quart. Oranges 30c per dozen, and lemons 25c per dozen. There are no new vegetables on the market. Potatoes expected shortly. Peas quoted at 12 to 15c per quart. The farmers are now engaged in looking after their hay. The crop will be fairly good. A New York correspondent writes thus to a local buyer: "The same features which have characterized the hay market for the last two weeks prevails, now. The amount of old hay on hand is sufficient to supply the market until the new crop commences to arrive, so it would seem that expectations for an advance in price in other than prime hay would be in vain. In order that the new crop may be brought to a higher standard and better prices realized, we would impress upon the farmers the necessity of cutting hay green, as so much depends upon the color that often times actual quality is lost sight of if hay is attractive in color. A nice green lot of hay always commands a premium." Wool is coming in slowly and is worth from 20 to 22c per lb. Hides are quoted at 6, 7 and 8c per lb.; deacons 20 to 40c each; calf skins 50 to 70c each; sheep pelts 25 to 30c each; lambs pelts 25 to 35c each.
