

E conversation after this was of such a desultory order that I do not recollect it. For some reason, perhaps from a desire to keep her identity and character in reserve,

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

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



An Appetizing Breakfast Dish.

The trimmings of cold boiled or roasted ham may be utilized in a very appetizing breakfast dish of ham and eggs on toast, Chop the ham fine and spread it upon delicate alices of buttered toast, and place in the oven for three or four minutes. Beat up six eggs with half a cupful of milk; add a little pepper and salt. Put this in a saucepan over the fire, add two ounces of butter and stir till it begins to thicken.
