#### WHAT SHALL WE WEAR?

STYLISH AND CONVENIENT WRAPS FOR TRAVELERS.

How Misses, Young Ladies, Matrons and Elderly Ladies Dress Their Hair-Picturesque Hats Designed for Country Wear and Garden Fetes.

The season of garden fetes is at-hand, and garden hats are consequently in order. The cut here given represents three striking models, which, while differing in style, are equally fashionable. Very quaint and becoming is the muslin bonnet, delicately shirred and trimmed with ruchings.



The wide brimmed straw hat, decorated at the front with large full loops of picot edged ribbon, is a very popular model, though perhaps not more so than the remaining one, a Tuscan straw trimmed with ribbon, flowers

and foliage.

#### Fashionable Hair Dressing.

The back hair is now worn only medium high in a round, soft coil, or braided round and round. Very young ladies wear a very small Greek knot or braid extending out from the head, but this is a severe style, and is becoming only to well shaped heads; the larger round braided coil close to the head is more generally becoming, and is used by young and elderly women. The French twist is less fashionable than formerly; instead, the back hair is waved across and carried up easily-not too tightly-from the nape of the neck to the coil. The straight bang is convenient in warm weather, and will be worn again quite short, not covering more than half the forehead, as all dressing for the front hair now shows more of the forehead than formerly. The pointed or curved Russian bang is still popular. The newest fancy is to brush the short front hair up from the forehead, curving it slightly and letting it rest against the long hair back, which is puffed upward slightly, but without a roll or cushion underneath, and is drawn back to the coil without parting. Elderly ladies wear soft chatelaine braids in two loops that are both high and low without being extreme either way. Children are again wearing their hair short, shingled closely, and with a small bang just in front, not beginning far back on the top of the head. If large girls of 13 years wear long hair, it hangs straight without being waved; it is better, however, to have their hair shingled, as it will then thicken and grow to a good length before they are grown. Misses wear braids tied and hanging or in loops or coils. The straight bang is liked for school girls, as it is easily kept in order.—Harper's Bazar.

#### AND 'TIS A MYSTERY STILL.

The Senation of the Hour, and the Nature and Supposed Cause of It.

OTTAWA, June 30.—The sensation of the hour at the capital is the mysterious drown. ing of Mrs. Smith. New evidence continues to come to light every day, and there is scarcely any doubt that she met with foul play at the hands of some one. The press is condemning the coroner for being dilatory in the matter, and as there is a well-to-do person connected with the affair there appears to be a desire to hush things up. The husband of the unfortunate woman has a lawyer and a detective at work and seems determined to sift things to the bottom. Almost everyone seems to implicate a certain high individual, yet there has been only one witness to say who he thought the murderer was, and no proof has been forth-coming in support of his assertions. The evidence is all circumstantial, yet there is a clue which our local detectives seem to be incapable of following up, The coroner's jury has had several sittings, but nothing definite has been decided in the shape of a

The depletion of the boarding houses and hotels has been completed, and the landlords are resting, as it were, on their oars, The capital is called the "boarding house city," and it is rightly named, for every other house is open to boarders. We have our "hash rows," and "lodgers' alleys," the natural outcome of a large floating population. Some of these houses are only open for the session, and a large number of persons hire furnished houses for the session only to sublet them to members and senators, their wives and families.

The cabinet ministers are holding daily sittings, getting through their business preparatory to the holidays.

The jubilee celebration of the capital will be a grand affair. Nearly two thousand troops will take part, including the Royal Scots, of Montreal, the Governor-General's Foot Guards, the 41st, 43rd, 49th, and 58th infantry regiments, the Dragoon guards, the field artillery and cavalry. Three thousand English and French school children will parade and sing national and patriotic songs. The parliament buildings and city will be grandly illuminated, and sports of all descriptions will take place.

The government contemplates the purchase of several Nordenfeldt gnns, two of which will be supplied to each of the permanent batteries and infantry schools. Some will be sent to the north-west for the use of the mounted police.

Hon. Mr. Foster, minister of fisheries, is going for a sail on the cruiser Acadia over the Canadian fishing ground.

Several western members remain. They have asked Sir John to grant representation in the cabinet to the country west of Lake Superior. The premier gave a favorable reply, but no action will be taken just now. Davin is seeking the position.

Mr. Hardisty, factor of the Hudson's Bay company, is likely to receive the senatorship for Alberta.

Sir Charles Tupper leaves for Halifax on Saturday en route to England. He will retain the port-folio of finance for six months at least, probably returning to attend next session.

Hon. George Duhamel, solicitor-general in the Mercier government, will contest Laprairie at the coming election to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Charlebois. Mr. Duhamel was defeated in Laprairie by Mr. Charlebois by twenty-three majority. The solicitor-general will have no difficulty in redeeming the county now.

The government has not yet accepted the resignation of Lieutenant-Governor Masson. Possibly he may be induced to continue in

### KNIGHTS OF LABOUR.

Voting on Their New Constitution-The Chief Clause Objected To.

PHILADELPHIA, June 29. - By returns made to the general headquarters of the Knights of Labour the new constitution of the order has been adopted by a threefourths vote. A clause, providing for the formation of national trades assemblies, sent out separately from the constitution, and voted upon by local assemblies throughout the order, has also been adopted by nearly the same vote. The new constitution will | Wonderfully Low Prices. be promulgated by the general executive board in a few days.

An analysis of the vote shows that nearly one half of the local assemblies that opposed the adoption of the new constitution did so on account of section 325, which reads: "No local or other assembly or member shall, directly or indirectly, give, sell, or have any ale, beer, or intoxicating liquors of any kind at any meeting, party, sociable, ball, picuic, or other entertainment whatever, appertaining to the order. Any member found guilty of violating this law shall be suspended for not less than six months or expelled. No fine shall be imposed for this offence. Any local or other assembly so suffering shall be suspended during the pleasure of the general executive board, or shall have its charter revoked by the said board."

The article on co-operation was adopted unanimously. It is quite lengthy, and provides for the creation and disbursement of a fund to aid co-operative enterprises. The new constitution gives the general executive board full power to settle all strikes and disputes, and increases the power of the general board in many other particulars.
