CANADIAN CHEESE MARKET.

BELLEVILLE, June 30.—The cheese board will have little business to transact for the next few weeks, as the balance of the June make has been sold at from 8 to 9c.

MADOC, June 29.—No market this week. No June cheese for sale. The price obtained was 8 1/2 to 9c.

PETERBOROUGH, June 29.—There was no board this week; prices 8 1/2 to 9c. Eight factories only have sold the balance of the June make. Twelve factories have refused to sell at the figures quoted.

NAPANEE, June 30.—The factories of the district have disposed of their June make at from 8 to 8 1/2c.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., June 30.—The cheese market was very excited. Four thousand boxes were registered on the board and as many more were offered outside, which is the biggest offering of the season.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

NEW YORK, July 1.—Kingston and Pembroke railway stock rose 2 1/2 per cent net on buying up R. P. Flower & Co. and others, based on an increase of 3 3/4 per cent in the earnings for the first three weeks of this month over the corresponding period of last year.

DROWNING ACCIDENT.

A Fatality Caused by the Overturning of a Skiff—Mr. Stoba Drowned.

Another sad and deplorable accident occurred yesterday about 12:30 o'clock, opposite the quarry, near Belle's Island. Mr. Stoba, cutter for Moore & Co., his fifteen year old son, and Mr. Carrington, left the city early in the day in a small row boat to enjoy a day's fishing. They rowed down the Rideau as far as the quarry referred to, where they dropped anchor. They then began fishing, which they enjoyed for some hours. Persons who saw the accident state that Stoba was in the act of pulling up the anchor (a large stone) when he overturned the boat and its occupants were precipitated into the water. Mr. Stoba was unable to swim and sank immediately. His son and Mr. Carrington held to the side of the boat until they were rescued by Messrs. James Neverson and George Thompson, who lost no time in launching a boat and pulling to them. The news of the affair spread rapidly through Barriefield and in a very few minutes Mr. Leader and Sergt. Thompson, of "A" battery, began grappling for his body, which they recovered in twenty minutes. The grappling hooks caught in his fishing line which was entangled about the body. The boat which the men occupied was very small and, it is said, unfit to carry the load it had. The deceased gentleman came to Kingston with his family, a wife and five children, about a year ago.

A Wonderful Performance.

SCANDAL IN SERVA.

The Royal Personage Whose Husband is Now Suing For a Divorce.



QUEEN NATALIE.

The change in the policy of Servia, implied in the choice of M. Ristic as King Milan's chief adviser, is an important event. It is closely followed by the news that King Milan is suing for a divorce from Queen Natalie. Since her departure from Belgrade (she is now travelling) the queen has scarcely communicated with her husband. For several years the royal couple have been living virtually apart, although there have been frequent violent scenes between them. Jealousy is said to be the cause of this state of things. The minister of one of the great powers and the wife of a minister are also mixed up in the affair. The difference between the king and queen, however, is not confined to domestic troubles, King Milan, believing that his wife was constantly conspiring against him, and intriguing to have him deposed and herself appointed as queen regent during the minority of the crown prince.

Queen Natalie, a Russian, has, of course, been supported throughout by Russia. The king, seeing that the growth of Russian influence had become too great for him to destroy, resolved to change his tactics, and to adopt the very policy that the queen had been directing against him, the substitution of Russian for Austrian influence. By this means King Milan counted upon averting the revolution that he believed to be brewing against himself, and upon checkmating the queen. By surrendering himself to Russian influence he hopes to facilitate the annulling of his marriage with Queen Natalie.

Queen Natalie is the daughter of a colonel in the Russian imperial guard. She was born May 12th, 1839, and married the reigning prince of Servia in October, 1875. Their only child, Alexander, was born Aug. 14th, 1876. His mother has superintended his education.

It is difficult to describe the rare beauty of the queen. Her classical features have a commanding majesty and charm. Her forehead is crowned by a profusion of jet black hair; her almond-shaped brown eyes have a look inexpressibly tender and sparkling with intelligence; her smile and laughter irradiate a clear complexion. She is tall, and surpassingly graceful, and her manners have a subtle charm, partly royal and wholly feminine.

She is well-read, speaks French fluently, takes particular pleasure in reading the poetry of France, and the publications treating on history, which is her favourite study. Before the fatal Servian-Bulgarian war she had made her remote little court the resort of western elegance, wit, and refinement. At the time of her marriage to the man who now seeks the divorce from her, he was known as Prince Milan. On March 6th, 1882, he was proclaimed King Milan I. His seat is a very uneasy one, and it is open to doubt that his present policy will save him much longer from the ignominy of losing his crown.
