On Monday last Peter L. Bogart, Napanea, died of partial paralysis, aged sixty years. Mr. Bogart was born in Gosport in 1827, and was the eldest of a family of nine children. His father was John Bogart. Five of the children are still living, two sons and three daughters. He was first married to Miss Van Tassel, of Thurlow, who died after a brief period of married life. Immediately after her death he gave up business in Sterling and married a daughter of Dr. McLean. He resided on the farm for about eight years, and then moved to Napanea. His wife died shortly after their arrival in town. He was married about ten years ago to Jane L. Grange. Deceased experienced his first stroke of paralysis four years ago last March, since which date he suffered eleven attacks of the malady. Mr. Bogart was a Methodist. Deceased was buried at Gosport. He leaves a wife and one child.

GEN. BOULANGER'S SUCCESSOR



The Rouvier cabinet, of which no great things are expected, will not suffer in public repute by the neglect of military interests. Its minister of war, since his accession to office, has given proof of his intention to carry on with energy those measures for the strengthening and improvement of the army that made Boulanger the idol of the French people. While he is not a showy officer, like his predecessor, he is thoroughly acquainted with the military affairs of the republic, and is a man of approved courage and capacity, laborious and studious. He gained the cross of a chevalier of the legion of honor in the Crimean war. When General Thibaudin was minister of war General Ferron served under him; also under General Campenon when he administered the affairs of the department. The general is sixty-seven years of age.  
The above portrait was made from the newest and best likeness of General Ferron, produced in Paris since his accession to the office, the incumbency of which gives him great distinction.

Candidates for first class subjects, grade C, commence writing on Monday, July 11th, and continue until Friday. Those on first class subjects, grade A and B, commence July 19th and continue through until Thursday.
