CANADIAN CHEESE MARKET.

KINGSTON, July 5.-E. J. Madden, the active cheese-buyer, purchased nearly the whole lot of cheese boarded at the last meeting of the Dairymen's association at 9c per lb. Every factory was tested as to weight and quality. North Shore stood among the first ; in fact Mr. Madden said that they were second to none in this vicinity.

LONDON, Ont., July 2. - Four factories today boarded 950 boxes. The sales were 325 at 9c, 280 at 93c, and 270 at 94c.

AMERICAN CHEESE MARKET.

OGDENSBURG, N.Y., July 3 .- Four-thousand boxes were offered and 1,000 sold at 94c. Salesmen withdrew from the market on account of buyers not wanting any more at the price, and they preferred holding another week rather than take less. At Canton 5,000 boxes were offered and 1,000 sold at Sic. The rest were held over.
