



#### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD.

KINGSTON, July 7 .- The county of Fron tenac cheese board held its regular weekly meeting in the Windsor hotel to-day. There were buyers present Messrs. Madden, Thompson and Miller. Only about 800 boxes of cheese, white and coloured, were registered, and represented nearly all the cheese in stock in the district fit for sale. It is the latter half of the June make. The salesmen state that the July make will be small if the present dry weather continues, and in consequence it is expected that the article will go up in price. The market at present is very uncertain, and buyers do not seem anxious to purchase. The limit given them to-day by the firms they represented was \$\frac{3}{4}c., but when they mentioned their figures the salesmen would not consider them. Madden, who it appears can always offer better inducements to makers than his colleagues, held the market at 9c.

Mr. Miller led these present to believe that probably his firm would allow him to beat the bid before the board closed. His expectations were not realized. He complained, however, that the salesmen at the last meeting had used him shabbily. He had offered the same price for certain lots as Madden who purchased all the cheese that had been registered. It was Miller's opinion that the salesmen who owned the cheese he wanted should have sold to him when his offer had not been beaten. Some of the salesmen agreed with Miller in the matter, and it was moved by T. Keenan, seconded by C. Langwith, that all cheese be sold to the highest bidder irrespective of the rules set down in the constitution bearing on the matter. The motion was carried.

No business was done until nearly 5 o'clock. The makers discussed the present state of the market before they decided to sell. Many thought it would be injudicious to accept the offer of 9c. while others firmly held the opinion that the price of cheese next week would be lower than at present. Mr. Thompson did not make any offers. He considered that Madden would be giving more than his limit allowed him if he bought for 9c. He strongly advised the salesmen to sell at that figure. Miller said there were at present 144,000 boxes of cheese afloat for the English market which was a large consignment. Some of the salesmen held for more than 9c. and did not get it.

The representatives of the following factories sold out to Madden at 9c. : Washburn, 45 boxes; Rising Sun, 30; Collinsby, 40; Glenvale, 45; Morning Star, 24; Rose Hill, 55; Cold Springs, 35; Storrington, 60; Perth Road, 49. The following factories registered : Duff, 100 boxes ; Glenburnie, 73; Collinsby, 40; Washburn, 45 Rising Sun, 30; Cold Springs, 65; Perth Road, 50; Oregon, 49; Union, 120; Pious Hollow, 35; Rose Hill, 55; Glenvale, 45; Railton, 70; Morning Star, 24. During the week Madden made contracts at 9c. for the June make of the following factories: Collinsby, 50; Lake View, 50; Maple Grove, 25; Elm Grove, 75; Pine Hill, 75; Lake Shore, 40, and Hartington, 170.

After the board closed Mr. Madden purchased 210 boxes of cheese. At nine o'clock Mr. Thompson received an order to buy all the cheese he could get at 9 1-16c, but he found that the salesmen had disposed of their lots. There is now no cheese of June make in this district.
