CANADIAN CHEESE MARKETS.

NAPANEE, July 15.—About 1,440 boxes of cheese were boarded here, but no sales were made. Buyers offered 8 1/2c and 8 3/4c, but 9c was desired.

PETERBORO, July 14.—Some 1,311 cheese from Peterboro section and 445 boxes from the Lindsay section were registered. The Peterboro stock sold at 9c and Lindsay at 6 1/2c.

MONTREAL, July 16.—Market quiet and without substantial change. Latest transactions at 8 1/2c to 9c for white, and 9c for colored, and top quotations considered extreme.

BELLEVILLE, July 14.—At Napanee yesterday 1,500 boxes were boarded, but no sales were made. Here 961 boxes were offered but none sold, the cheese being too green for shipment.

LISTOWEL, July 14.—At the last Listowel cheese fair, held here to-day, 23 factories were registered, 2,900 boxes pale and 2,800 colored, first half of July make. Eight buyers were present.

WOODSTOCK, July 14.—At the cheese market to-day five factories offered 1,705 boxes of cheese, chiefly the first ten days of July make. No sales were made.

KINGSTON, July 16.—(To the Editor): Kindly insert the accompanying letter from Mr. W. Johnson of Belleville. It will carry a wrong impression created by the associated press reports.—CITIZEN.

To the Editor of the Mail.

Sir,—Amongst the Associated Press cables, published in your issue of the 11th inst., is one headed "An Orange Orator left for Canada," stating "the Rev. Dr. MacBeth, of Ennisceorthy, was embarking on the Celtic for New York and Canada, whither he goes to undo the mischief Mr. O'Brien has wrought in the Dominion." Permit me to say that the person who sent that cablegram either willfully or ignorantly misrepresented the Rev. Dr. MacBeth and his mission to Canada. Dr. MacBeth is not an Orangeman, much less an "Orange orator." His mission to Canada is not "to undo the mischief Mr. O'Brien has wrought in Canada," but is to lay before the Canadian people the claims of the Irish Society, a society which for years has most successfully endeavoured to give the Irish people God's word in the Irish language, and this he proposes to do by holding public meetings and delivering lectures.

There is no fear of anyone being sent to this country on so quixotic a mission as "to undo the mischief Mr. O'Brien has wrought in Canada." The unionists "at home" are well enough aware that Mr. O'Brien's avalanche of untruths, either published by him in United Ireland or uttered on the platform, are believed by none but the most ignorant, and therefore the most prejudiced, and that "his mission to Canada" has done more to open the eyes of the Canadian people to the true and ultimate aim of Irish agitators, and to convince them that a cause that needs so much misrepresentation as Mr. O'Brien indulges in so lavishly, is not worthy of the sympathy of a people like the Canadian people.—W.
