COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

CANADIAN CHEESE MARKETS.

NAPANEE, July 15.—About 1,440 boxes of cheese were boarded here, but no sales were made. Buyers offered 84c and 84c, but 9c was desired.

Peterboro, July 14.—Some 1,311 cheese from Peterboro section and 445 boxes from the Lindsay section were registered. The Peterboro stock sold at 9 c and Lindsay at 6 1-6c. There was a lively discussion over the conduct of some factories selling their cheese off the board. An agreement was drawn up, each one binding himself on a forfeit of \$25 or suspension from the board for the balance of the season to neither buy nor sell off the board.

MONTREAL, July 16. - Market quiet and without substantial change. Latest transactions at 84c to 9c for white, and 9c for colored, and top quotations considered extreme. Exports from New York to date 22,713,000 pounds, against 18,298,000 last year, or an increase of about 88,000 boxes. A year ago prices were Sc to Sic, cable 41s 6d, ; two years ago Sc to Sic, cable 41s 6d.

Belleville, July 14.—At Napanee yesterday 1,500 boxes were boarded, but no sales were made. Here 961 boxes were offered but none sold, the cheese being too green for shipment. Nine cents, however, was paid after the board.

LISTOWEL, July 14.—At the last Listowel cheese fair, held here to-day, 23 factories were registered, 2,900 boxes pale and 2,800 colored, first half of July make. Eight buyers were present. Sellers were holding for over 9c. Three hundred sold at 9%c for colored. Buyers were not inclined to buy as there will be nothing ready to ship till after next fair. The make of cheese in this section has dropped about 20 per cent.

Woodstock, July 14. - At the cheese market to-day five factories offered 1,705 boxes of cheese, chiefly the first ten days of July make. No sales were made. Factorymen report a shrinkage in the milk delivery in consequence of drought.

THE HOP OUTLOOK.

UTICA, N.Y., July 14.—The vine is now in the blow and seems to promise fairly. It is an early bloom and may indicate a short crop. The hot weather affected the vines, but the recent rains have revived them. About fifty bales of 1885 in Madison county have been purchased on private terms. Otherwise there has been little doing.
