COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE CHEESE MARKET. NAPANEE, July 22.—None of the 1,275 boxes boarded were sold; 10 1/2c was offered for the whole supply, and 10 1/4c for selections, but sellers wanted 10 1/2c.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., July 21.—There was a very excited market to-day. Four thousand boxes were registered on the board and fully 1,000 were outside. Nearly all were sold at 10 1/2c @ 10 1/4c, the ruling price being 10 1/2c.

STRAITFORD, Ont., July 21.—The offerings at the cheese market to-day were 1,620 boxes first half of July make. One factory sold all July, about 700 boxes white, at 10 1/2c.

FACTS ABOUT CEYLON.

Ceylon exports about 385,000 pounds of cocoa yearly. About 15,000 pounds of cinchona is produced in Ceylon annually.

Ceylon tea is very pungent, seeming to have an over supply of tannin. Ceylon has a population of nearly 3,000,000, mainly Singhalese and Tamils.

In seventy years Ceylon has built 1,300 miles of macadamized roads and 900 graveled roads. The exports of coffee from Ceylon are decreasing, and the exports of tea increasing rapidly.

According to the Mohammedans, Ceylon was the home of Adam and Eve after losing paradise. Ceylon has 128 postoffices, 1,100 miles of telegraph wires, thirty-two newspapers and periodicals.

According to the census of 1881, there are in Ceylon 280,000 Roman Catholics, 60,000 Protestants, 1,700,000 Buddhists, 600,000 Hindus, and 300,000 Mohammedans.

ITEMS ABOUT BEANS.

The best pea beans are raised in Vermont. California sends large quantities of beans east. Maine exports a few beans, but imports more.

About 350,000 bushels of beans were sold in Boston in 1886. Michigan is exporting beans and increasing its yield annually.

The French people use larger quantities of beans than Yankees. Ten per cent. of the beans used in Boston come from Canada.

In the present year one Boston firm will put up 4,500,000 cans of baked beans. The only eastern state that raises as many beans as she consumes is Vermont.

Seventy per cent. of the beans sold in the Boston market are from the western counties of New York. About 100,000 bushels of beans are raised in New England, while 500,000 bushels are imported by the states.

SENATORIAL FISHERMEN.

Last Tuesday a meeting of the owners was held on the spot. Together they inspected the farm and were more than pleased at the prospect. Very clearly defined veins, or "leads," of fine gold were found. Some of the dirt was washed in an ordinary pan, and pleasing evidences of the valuable metal discovered. The owners are satisfied that there is to be found at the place gold in good paying quantities.

The Dominion Industrial Exhibition. The Dominion exhibition for the year is to be held at Toronto from 5th to 17th of September, in conjunction with the industrial fair, and these two combined will be one of the best we have had in Canada. The prizes offered amount to \$30,000. The Toronto people are making great preparations, and although their exhibition grounds and buildings were already the best in the country they are adding \$40,000 worth of buildings this year. Large special prizes are offered for horses, cattle, sheep and pigs during the first week in addition to the regular prizes awarded the second week. Superior special attractions are being secured, to be distributed throughout so that the first week will be equally as attractive as the second. Cheap railway rates and excursions will also be given throughout. Entries, except for fruit and grain, have to be made before the 15th of August. Prize lists can be obtained from the secretaries of all agricultural societies and mechanics' institutes, or from the secretary at Toronto.
