

TRADE OBSTRUCTIONS.

The Spectator makes merry over an item in the WHIG to the effect that a farmer on Wolfe Island, who had paid several hundred dollars in charges on exported goods and stock, would have been the richer by those hundreds of dollars had trade been unre stricted between Canada and the United States. And the Spectator remarks :

"We thought it was the consumer who paid the duty. That is the free trade contention. That is the assertion reformers have been making for the past ten years. Did not Mr. Blake prove that a farmer could wear a shirt only seven yards long, whereas under the old tariff he could afford one of the regulation length of ten yards? Have we not been told with wearisome iteration that sugar would be two or three cents a pound cheaper than it is if it were not for the duty? Were we not told that price of coal would fall half a dollar a ton so soon as the duty was removed ?"

The consumer does pay the duty, under certain circumstances, but these circumstances have not been experienced by the Wolfe Island farmer. The buyer of whatever the Canadian farmer has to sell, in the United States market, at the current prices, does not pay the consul's fees and other perlimin ary expenses, met in Canada, and the Spec. tator knows this as well as the WHIG.

That the Canadians paid the duty on coal goes without saying. It was admitted by the finance minister in his budget speech, and by the local coal merchants without regard to politics. And if further evidence upon the point be wanting it can be supplied in the fact that steamboats and tugs frequently went to Oswego, when on their way up the lake, for the fuel they required for a round trip, and the duty on which would have amounted to a considerable sum.

The Wolfe Island farmer knows that he paid all the expenses connected with the export of his, goods. He would not have sold them to the Americans at all had they to pay the export fees in addition to their market values. He realized more in selling in the United States markets than he could have done and sold his produce here, and he feels that he is out the cost of trade obstructions represented by the consulates and custom houses.

LAWYERS ATTENTION.

The New York Times takes the position that the lawyers, who acted as Jacob Sharp's counsel, should be punished with him for the wrong they urged him to commit. He committed the crime and they advised it.

"Now," says the Times, "what is going to be done about it? We deem it of a very great importance in the effort to check and uproot this dangerous and demoralizing crime of bribery that the conspicuous part which these lawyers took in the infamous Sharp business should not go unpunished. The legal profession is concerned in this matter, the judiciary is concerned in it, and the public is concerned in it. What can the legal profession do ? It can purge itself of the disgrace by condemning and discountenancing the conduct of these lawyers and cutting them off from association with members of the bar, and the appropriate agency for this purpose is the bar association of this city. What can the judiciary do? The supreme court can, by proceedings initiated by itself or on motion proceeding from the bar; expel these men from the further practice in this state of the profession whose honour they have betrayed, whose good name they have disgraced. And what can be done on behalf of the public? If these men have committed crimes by counselling, aiding, and abetting grand larceny and bribery, they should be indicted and put on trial for it, and if found guilty should be punished precisely as if they had not been acting under the cloak of the legal profession. It is the duty of the first grand jury to whose lot it falls to make inquiry into crimes committed within this jurisdiction to take up this matter and call for evidence upon which an indictment may be framed, and it is the duty of the prosecuting officer of this county to facilitate that task. We shall not allow this duty to be forgotten, and justice will not be vindicated for the infamous crimes of 1884 so long as the lawyers who participated in them go free from punish-

This is a matter which concerns the whole legal profession. The enquiry is pertinent as to how far a lawyer can safely go in directing a client to evade and break the law. Defending a prisoner who has, of his own accord, jumped into trouble, and helping one into crime are different things, and the Times purposes to have the line drawn between them. As the exposer of the Tweed infamy its influence, if it goes on the war path, is to be feared.

SOUTH RENFREW.

In the Belleville Intelligencer of yesterday's date we find the following:

The WHIG is wrong as to Mr. McIntyre's being as good a liberal as he ever was, for in his acceptance of the candidature he declared that he would stand as an "independent liberal." Evidently the grit party had no hope of retaining the constituency by running a straight party canddate, to it has

chosen, as a last resort, a gentleman upon whom, together with his associates, it has showered abuse for years. Mr. McIntyre may be elected, but he will not swallow the grit programme.

The Intelligencer is not aware of the intimacy existing between Mr. McIntyre and the leaders of the liberal party, Mr. Mackenzie and Mr. Laurie in particular, and of the cordial endorsement of his candidature by these gentlemen. Nor is it aware that his opponent, Mr. Ferguson, has announced himself as an independent conservative, else it would not have attempted to be so sarcastic at its own . expense. The political faith of one candidate is quite as good as that of the other, and the conditions of their party acceptance are precisely the same. Of this fact the Intelligencer was not conscious, of course, or it would not have been so compromising in its remarks.

And by the way our friend overlooks an important feature in the claims of Mr. Mc-Intyre to the support of the electors, i.e., that he is a commercial unionist. As such his depreciation by the Intelligencer will be more than set-off or counterbalanced by the appreciation of its foremost allies in the cause of conservatism. In this respect Mr. McIntyre is swallowing that which the Intelligencer would be horrified to prescribe for him, but yet that which will yet be the salvation of him politically. It is the one thing new upon which the people have been asked to pronounce, and the issue has been made sufficiently direct to warrant the electors of South Renfrew making no mistake about it.

As for the abuse said to have been showered upon Mr. McIntyre he does not appear to be so much worried about it as some of his political opponents. The best evidence in support of the conclusion that he has not regarded the criticism of the schemes of the Canada Pacific railway as personally offensive is to be found in his associations, and these are entirely liberal. Sir Donald Smith, as an independent conservative, has stopped at nothing which a party leader would impose upon a servile follower. If Mr. McIn. tyre's independence is of a similar sort, and he connects himself with the liberal party, as it is said he intends to do, Mr. Laurier red have no uneasiness about his allegiance.

MERCIER AND THE CHURCH.

Gets Authority from Rome to Deny some Accusations Made Against Him.

MONTREAL, July 27. - In the speech made by Hon. H. Mercier, at Laprairie, and in connection with the election now pending there, he said:

"In several of the speeches which you have heard I have been accused of errors and misdeeds. Some of these accusations have been stupid in the extreme. It has been said that I was the insulter of the Roman Catholic clergy in this province, that I had flung insult after insult in the face of Cardinal Taschereau. I wish to make a confession and carry with me the absolution of the good people of Laprairie. I wish to put an end at once and for ever to the attacks which are being made upon me, of having made war upon the church and of having been its persecutor instead of one of its obedient children. A Coloured Girl, Who Poisoned a Baby,

SENTENCED TO BE HUNG.

Must Suffer the Penalty. BARNWELL, S.C., July 27. - Judge Hudson has sentenced Axey Cherry, a coloured girl, 12 years old, to be hanged on the 16th of September for the murder of the infant of Mr. Amos Williams, of Allendale, Barnwell county. The child was sent by her mother to act as nurse for the Williams baby. She attended to her duties in so negligent a manner that she had to be constantly scolded. After a scolding one day she was overheard muttering to herself that she wasn't going to bother with that baby much more. A few days after this concentrated lye was used in scouring the floor, and when Mrs. Williams left the room for a few minutes she told Axey that the lye was poisonous, and that she mustn't touch it. On her return Mrs. Williams was horrified to find her baby's mouth full of concentrated lye. Axey ran out of the house, saying as she left, "I don't reckon I'll have to nurse that baby much longer."

The young murderess, all through her trial, had no idea of the terrible nature of her deed, and when she was sentenced to be hanged gazed stupidly at the judge and grinned as she played with the buttons on her dress. As she was being carried back to jail she saw her father and made an effort to go to him. She cried for the first time when she was told that she could not go home but must go back to jail to await her
