COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

CHEESE BOARD MEETING.

KINGSTON, July 29.—The regular weekly meeting of the County of Frontenac dairy-men's association was held in the Windsor hotel yesterday. There was more cheese offered than there has been at a market held here this season, yet the buyers did not want it except at very low prices, and were not at all anxious whether the salesmen sold or not. Mr. Madden was the only buyer who made an offer. He bid 10 1-16c. for the cheese registered, and for the whole July make. This was a very small figure, considering that Madden paid 101c. and 101c. for cheese at the last board meeting. He admitted that he and others had bought cheese at the last board meeting at figures beyond their limits, expecting that it would rise in price. They had been disappointed. Cheese had fallen since then. The firm he represented was not pressing him to buy cheese this week. The buyers who were present last week were absent. Why? Because the English market did not warrant their buying. Madden's offer was not popular. He secured only 500 boxes. There were 1,445 boxes of cheese registered, 615 coloured, 830 white.

CHEESE MARKET.

MONTREAL, July 28.—It is reasonably certain that the advance has been checked and a bull in the trade set in pending further development which it would not be surprising to see take the shape of a contracting craze, which would give renewed excitement to the market. As, however, contracting on the basis of 104c. for July would mean steep figures for the late make, there may be some effort to depress the market in the hope of getting in a little cheaper. Finest white, 10 c. to 10 c.; finest coloured, 10ge. to 10ge.; fine, 9gc. to 10gc.; medium, 8hc. to 9hc.

Whonstock, July 28. - At the Woodstock cheese market eleven factories offered 3,535 boxes. A few factories had all July, while some offered the first half and others the last half. Several buyers were present, but the negotiations between buyers and salesmen resulted in nothing. Salesmen report a great falling off in the flow of milk and state that corn and green fodder are withering owing to continued dry weather.

THE HOP MARKET.

The hop market remains without material change. First quality of hops are not plenty in New York or in other hop centres, and there seem to be no disposition on the part of dealers to press an unwilling market. Transactions are principally confined to moderate lots, brewers still adhering to the "hand to mouth" policy in their purchases. Country dealers are not picking up '85 hops very closely, but prefer their chances with the coming crop. On Saturday the contract was made, 5,000 lbs. of 1887 crop for 20c. per lb.

Infanticide.

KINGSTON, July 29 .-- (To the Editor) : The Montreal Witness has lately called attention to the awful prevalence of this crime in Montreal, and its columns have contained opinions of various correspondents upon the best means of prevention. An inquiry at the Kingston hospital leads me to believe that about five illegitimate births a month occurring there afford only partial evidence of the extent of this crime in Kingston. What becomes of the infants ? A woman is found who, for \$30 or \$40, takes an infant, and that is the last the brutal mother knows of its history. Leaving the city by night the infant is car. ied to the nunnery at Ottawa, where \$20 is the price of admission. Protestantism and protestant civilization knows no christian institution in Ontario where foundling victims may escape a persecution worse than Herod's. His had no pretence about it. The persecution of noglect, which consigns the innocent victims of lust in this community to an early tomb, raises pretences and excuses less honest than the murderous envy of him whose slaughter of the male infants of Bethlehem is an early Sunday school lesson. There was no disguise in his purpose. What horrible dis-guises are wrapped around the social neglect —murder—of the innocents whose lives are sacrificed in the cruel methods of the "baby farmer" and in the efforts to have them removed long distances at a time when travel means death. The subject surely demands investigation.

All who can contribute to a knowledge of the facts will confer a public benefit by ventilating them. How many illegitimate births have occurred at the hospital in the past year? How many declarations of bas-tardy have been filed with the magistrate? What other evidence is there of the extent of illegitimacy? What becomes of the children !- A CITIZEN.
