SEED WEEAT-THRESHING MACHINES -As it is of the utmost importance to farmers wsow good seed in order to ensure, other circumstances combining a good crop, we subjoin, for their benefit, the fallowing extract from a communiestion of a practical man to an American paper, which deserves their attent ion:

"I would simply say that I cannot account for wheat not sprouting except that its vitality might have been destroyed by the process of threshing. Most of our seed is three by machinery, and, I think, to the destruction of much grow, and that the same, not the can machine, will grow better than even wheatunsprouted, that has been through our threshing Imachines. Last season-I selected fifty kettels the other half.
