COST OF FUEL TO RAILROADS. - Mr McCallum. Superintendent of the New York and Erie Railroad, has recently presented an able and thorough report of the working of the road under his supervision. From this it appears that the cost of fuel on the New York and Erie Road -which runs much of its length through a thickly wooded country-is 80-100 cent for each ton drawn, per mile. No less than 10,032 cords of wood were consumed during the month of Juin running 287,587 miles. At this rate the number of cords of wood consumed in the year will amount to 120,384, or a pile 182 miles long, 4 feet high and 4 feet broad!
