Sugar Raising in Illinois. - The Chicago Free Press has an article which exhibits very encouraging results from experiments with the new Chinese Sugar Cane in Wabash county, Illinois, last season. The following statement of the writer is remarkable :- "I am well convinced that in 1860 the Southern planter will have no sale for his sugar in the State of Illinois. From present indications there will be one hundred acres [of Chinese Sugar Cane] raised in Wabash County next year, which will save the County \$10,000."
