> There is now unhappily no room to doubt that the wheat harvest is far below an average. If we are to believe persons who have travelled much through the country, it was little more than half crops. Oats are good, in some places, but mot every where. Peas are generally spoken of, and potatoes appear to have entirely escaped the rot. The failure of the wheat crop in two successive years ought to admonish the farmers not to depend saexclusively upon this single cror. It is no doubt dithienly to make such a change, as wheat is the principal exportable grain out of which anything considerable can be realized in foreign markets. Ar unusually large quantity of land is being put under wheat this autumn; which shows that the failure of the last two years has not discouraged the hopes of the farmer.
