New York, October 6. The Crystal Palace was burned down yesterday afternoon at five o'clock. The fire broke out in the lumber room, which was filled with old lumber, and is believed to have been the work of an incendiary. When the fire was first discovered the Palace engine was brought out, but the hose was so full of holes as to be useless. The fames spread with astonishing rapidity creating intense excitement among the vie tors, of whom there was estimated to be upwards of 2,000 present. So rapidly did the flames spread, that in less than fifteen minutes from its commencement the immense dome fell.
