The Society was formed, with Mr. R. Macpherson, the energetic and efficient emigrant agent, as Secretary, and there can be no doubt of its success and the benefit it will confer. Instead of immigrants passing this city to reach places further west, whither the immigrant is attracted by the knowledge that there are societies existing which will look after his interests, and are anxious for his or her labor, they will be induced to remain here since they will be equally sure of employment. Each member of the society will reap a benefit in being able to procure skilled or unskilled labor as he requires it. At Ottawa and Cobourg where societies have been in operation under the Liberal Govern ment regulations, the benefit to farmersan business men has been so great that the eperations of those bodies have been widely extended, and next season we have no doubt a similar effort will be called forth, by the profits of experience in Kingston.
