According to a Santiago correspondent of the New York Times, the prisoners of the "Virginias" remaining after the massacre of the tifty three, were saved from a like fate by the noble conduct of a Betw. ish commander. They were to have been executed on the 7th, but on the morning of that day the English man-of-war "Niobe" entered the port. Without saluting the Spanish fort, or waiting to cast anchor, the captain got into his boat and was immediately pulled ashore. Proceeding directly to the Governor's house, he peremptorily demanded that the executions should cease. The Governor at first declared that he had no right to interfere. but the captain said that in the absence of an American man-of-war he would take the responsibility of protecting American citizens, and gnarding the honor of the American flag. It is said he gave General Burriel his choice between yielding to his demands or having the town bombarded. and the Governor accordingly gave way.
