SPRING ASSIZES.—The Belleville Spring Assizes will open Tuesday next before Mr. Justice Burton, Mr. B. M. Britton, Q.C. of Kingston will conduct the criminal business, on behalf of the Crown.

LOADED WITH ICE.—Capt Dix finished loading the schooner White Oak with ice on Friday. The ice was thirteen inches thick, and is the best that has been loaded in any vessel here this winter. The White Oak is bound to Black River, near Cleveland, Lake Erie. She makes the eighth vessel that has been loaded with ice at Garden Island this winter. The ice will go out of this harbor very fast this Spring—that is, if the vessels get a fair wind.

BATTERSEA ITEMS

Business has been very brisk in Battersea this winter, the farmers of this neighborhood and vicinity bringing in their logs, shingle-bolts and grain to the mills, and as a consequence some of them are running constantly day and night. Notwithstanding the hard times cry, things seem to be in a more flourishing and prosperous condition here than for some time past.

It is understood that a cheese factory is shortly to be started here. There is certainly a good opening for one, and such an undertaking will no doubt be attended with success.

Lectures on temperance are to be given by Drs. Dupuis and McCannan, of Kingston, in the M.E. Church, in this place, on the 30th.

On Sunday evening last the Rev. J.C. Garrett delivered a very able and effective discourse in memory of the late Rev. George McDougall. The sermon was listened to with the deepest attention by all.

QUEEN'S COLLEGE. (Journal Items). On Thursday evening, 16th inst., the Rev. M. W. Maclean, of Belleville, delivered an address before the Missionary Association of the College of April 22d, which was eminently practical, full of information and advice, drawn from Mr. Maclean's personal experience in mission work, and was just the kind of address required by young men about to engage in missionary labours.

On Monday evening last the Rev. J. Fraser Campbell, who is soon to proceed to India to engage in the mission work there, delivered an address before the Theological Department, in which he treated of the claims of the Foreign Mission, and advised all to consider whether it was more important that they should give their time and energies to a few who are surrounded by gospel ordinances, or to give their time to thousands and millions who had never heard of the Saviour and who have no opportunities of receiving instruction.

On Monday evening last, the Board met to decide on the applications for office of Head Master for the High School. Thirteen applications were received, it was decided to accept the offer of E. L. Chamberlain B. A., the present Assistant Master, who offered to take the position for \$800 per annum. A. F. Knight, B. A., of Hawkesbury, was selected as Assistant Master to replace Mr. Chamberlain.

THE DUNKIN BY-LAW of this Village has been quashed at last, without costs. So far as we can learn, the fatal defect lay in the fact that four weeks did not elapse between the first day of polling, although the notice appeared in four weekly issues of the paper.

WHIGGINGS.

A new Post Office has been opened at Ferry Point. There are 1,400,449 slaves now in Brazil. Forty-two theatres are in full blast in London this season.

Edwin Booth cleared \$52,000 by his Southern tour, and is on his way to Europe. During Lent the self-fish men have a chance. Princes and vicars are gathered in Surrey and Kent.

The Queen's pictures at the Centennial are to be guarded day and night by a squad of policemen. The girl Mary Stewart, who was injured in the wooden factory, Arrapric, is still unable to fully recover.

The London Advertiser says—Hampilton manufacturers are anticipating a very busy season. They are going to help themselves now. They are making sandwiches to be sold at some of the Philadelphia restaurants. They will be kept in sawdust until May 10.

The pastoral charge of McNab and Horton, Rev. Roy Campbell, M.A., being minister of it, has done a laudable thing in instituting a scholarship to be connected with the Theological Department. The present value is \$42.

The steamer City of Sandauky, lying up at Port Stanley, caught fire on Friday night at 10 o'clock and is a total loss. The fire broke out in the schooner William Elmer, and took fire, and she sustained the loss of her rigging and foremast, and part of her hull.

The library of Strasburg, which was destroyed by fire during the siege of that city in 1870, has been re-established by the German Government, and now counts 450,000 volumes. Many of them were sent from foreign countries, 2,750 persons in all having contributed.
