

THE ESCAPED PRISONERS.—Mr. Moffat, Reeve of Pembroke, has received a telegram from Ottawa, detecting him to the whereabouts of the escaped prisoners from the Penobscot jail. One of them has gone to New York, while the other two have contented themselves with gaining the American side of the St. Lawrence. So the report of a man named McDonald of Hull had captured Jordan, one of the escaped prisoners, is untrue.
