PROMOTIONS.—The *Ottawa Gazette* of July 1st contains the following promotions and appointments:

TO OGDENSBURG.

The excursion to Ogdensburg on the steamer *Maud* was a splendid success—the event of the day. The boat conveyed from the city the finest crowd that ever boarded the staunch and pretty little steamer, and the sail down the river was enjoyed more than words or pen can express. Leaving Kingston at 6:30 o'clock the run to the "burg was made in excellent time, the precious cargo being delivered at 10:45, happy and buoyant spirits. The "burg was an attractive spot—gaily decorated in holiday attire, and having a programme of amusements that was worthy of the occasion, and a credit to the people. The town was visited by five other excursion parties, all of whom mingled with the resident celebrants and made the scene of festivities, in fact the whole place exceedingly lively. The fair grounds were the great point of interest. Here most of the Kingstonians beat their way, anxious to see the match between the St. Lawrence Club and the Ottawas, for a purse of \$75, offered by the Centennial Committee. The contest opened at about 2:30 o'clock, and ended shortly after 4 o'clock in a victory for the Kingston-nine, who played an excellent game, and made a score of 22 to their opponents' 7. During the match the pitcher of the Ottawas—a new member—had one of the fingers of the left hand split by a hot ball; but after having the wound dressed very p'nicly continued the game to the end. The Ottawas were rather hard to please in some respects; but they were quite satisfied with the result, and admitted that victory was won by the Kingstonians by their superior play. CONCERT AND SNOW.—On Friday the Midsummer Floral Show of the Electoral Division Society will take place in the City and Ontario Halls. The examination for this Scholarship was held on Friday last, the subjects being those for matriculation in Queen's College. The Scholarship, which carries with it a nomination to the full course of attendance, was gained by Master W. Briden, of Oshawa, he having obtained 2,427 marks out of a maximum of 3,000.
