The Palladium says: The following, in regard to the water level of Lake Ontario for 1876, is obtained from the U. S. Enginter office, Oswego: The spring rise was completed on June 1st, when the lake was four feet above extreme low stage. From this date, it remained nearly at a stand still, though the tendency was slightly upward, until July invitation is extended.
