

AS ADY BOASOD Since writing I have read a letter from "A Sportsman," who mays that the golden plover not visit our shores, except in the autumn. This is probably correct as far as the neighbourhood of Kingston is concerned, but there are other portions of the Province of Ontario where not only this species but many other kinds of plover pay lengthened visits, and some of these remain to breed.

There are about twenty different varieties of ployer to be found in Ontario, and I am strongly of opinion that they are well worth protecting, instead of being classed with "hawks, 'crows, owls, ravens, &c.," in the manner proposed by Dr. Mostyn's Bill.

While I am on this subject, it may not be amies to notice an Act now before the Legislative Assembly in reference to the protection of game and fur-bearing animals : This Bill was introduced by Dr. Mostyn, and is of course quite distinct from the Insectivorons Bird Act.
