The following is Mr Kirkpatrick's Bill en-Law of Evidence in certain cases of misde-

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :--

1. On the trial of any indictment or other proceeding for the non-repair of any public public highway, river, or bridge, or of any other indictment or proceeding instituted for the purpose of trying or enforcing a civil right only, every defendant to such indictment or proceeding, and the wife or husband of any such defendant, shall be admissible and compellable to give evidence.
