Pherson bestowed his men with much judgment and they worked together charmingly After a severe tussel with the police, nearly all the windows in the hall had been broken, and it became known that Rossa had escaped, the cry of "Owen Cosgroves" was raised, and the crowd made a rusg up Jarvis and along Queen street. At the corner of Adelade and Jarvis streets another brush with the police occurred, and Policeman Worth was struck in the head with a stone and was rendered insensible. He was carried into the White Rose Tavern. where his injuries were found to be so severe that orders were given for his removal to his home, No. 153 Church street. The stone struck him on the temple, and at last accounts he was very low and not expected to recover. The crowd at the junction of the two streets was dispersed, and the different squads of police were ordered to move westward along Queen street as rapidly as ate Mokinitza. possible. The sidewalks were crowded with men hastening towards Cosgrove's, where met with stubborn resistance, pistols being frequently used. At this point a young man named Wm. Clogg, living at No. 151 Queen street, was shot in the back. The bullet struck the shoulderbade, and glanced upwards and was a spectator. A man named Marsh was shot in the face, his nose being broken. John McConnell, of Parkdale, another spectator, was wounded in the head. Edward Foley, of 20 Victoria street, was severely out in the head by a policeman's club. Samuel Archer, shot, one in the arm, another through the leg and another through the palm of the hand. The rattle of pistol shots in the street was incessant. Before the police could get in a favourable position to protect Cosgrove's house the mob opened a fusilade of stones upon it, and in a few moments the windows were demolished and the old house badly wrecked.
