(London Times.)

In a previous article we discussed the military resources in infantry, artillery, and cavalry which would be available in the ! event of a Continental war. Though, however, the fighting force of an army is composed entirely of these three branches of the service, still there are many other ingredients in the composition of a field force-ingredients without which the most highly-trained and efficient infantry, cavalry, and artillery are practically useless ffensive purposes. "Unfortunately, fact is not fully realized by the public, which grudges money for that which, though ndispensable, makes in time of peace little show. Hence we have scarcely ever on the a thoroughly equipped army in the field, but have had to extemporize that which in truth requires most careful preparation.
