This production is certainly unusually early, and proves the mildness

Snow has fallen in very small quantities, but there has in fact been no cold-the thermometer has continued for several days about freezing point. THE BRITISH LION AFLOAT. How the British Fleet Made the

Montreal Star.

Passage the Dardanelles. The details of the passage of the Dardanelles by the British fleet are more interesting than the bloodless result would warrant. When Admiral Hornby, with five of his biggest ships, was turned back from Chanak by the Sultan's order, the disgust of both officers and men was loud and emphatic, For three days the fires were kept banked ready for ten knots steaming at a few minutes notice. On Tuesday the 12th of February, a second telegram arrived, and a meeting was held on board the flag ship, at which a plan bfattack was determined upon. In the morning the ships weighed anchor amid an excitement which had not been paralleled since the days when Nelson signalled his famous order at Trafalgar. rain was pouring in torrents, a thick haze obscured the land, and the sea was rough and stormy. Shortly after 10 o'clock the fleet passed the castles of Europe and Asia, at the entrance of the straits, the Alexandria Sultan and Temeraire in the starboard division, and the Agiucourt, Achilles and Swiftsure on the port. The guns were double shotted with heavy charges of sharpnell shell Toronto Flour Stere, Brock-st. and the tops filled with riflemen and Gatling guns. Three miles below Chanak the Turks had an immense gun, weighing forty tons from which serious trouble was anticipated. It was mounted in a small earthwork, or the European shore, the exact locality which was unknown. In the midst of a high wind and a thick snowstorm the six ships pulled about in search of this dreaded gun. at one time they passed within two hundred vards of it without knowing it. About Chanak the wind, fog, and sleet increased. It was impossible to see the length of the decks, and it was only by the constant use of the lead that the narrow channel between Abydos and Sestos was cleared. The great batteries of Forts Namazieh and Chanak Castle were reached early in the afternoon.
