

Protection Notes.

(National.) The Free Trade papers, led by the Globs, deny that protection would be of any benefit to the manufacturers or workingmen, but insist that it would result in an influx of mechanics from the United States, whose competition would injure our workingmen. The question arises, If protection would not benefit the manufacturers and would not increase the wages of the workingmen, what inducement would there be for these Yankee mechanics to come?

No paper is more decided than the Globe in its denial that the financial policy of the Government can have anything to do with the commercial depression. Yet it asserts that the financial policy of the United States is the author of all the financial evils under which not the United States alone, but the whole continent, is suffering. The difficulty which ever attends the bolstering up of a bad cause is telling on the Globe's morality. Russian Diplomatists.

Resian diplomafists have, for long, had a high reputation for intelligence. Under years' experience in the largest cities in Napoleon 1., there was a Count Czerniche ff at Paris who was the pet of Parisian society. So clever was he that he managed to get hold of all the plans of the Moscow campaign. came across the following description of him last week in a volumn of old memoirs: "A flat nose, Chinese eyes, almost closed by winking, a large mouth, a sallow brown complexion could never constitute a handsome man, but the remarkable elegance of his manners, his unrivalled address and finished education, a constant attention to the ladies, and his readiness to enter into all amusements, rendered him most popular. He was thought to be exclusively intent on pleasing. whilst his only object was to serve his Sovereign, and he discovered all our plans by pretending to want to know nothing about them. He obtained a greater knowledge of our policy in the midst of balls than in the public offices, and whilst he was dancing not a word escaped him of the conversations of the various groups near him. In a waltz he always stopped near a personage of note, and then, in a friendly, off-hand way, entered into conversation with him. He feigned love to the wives of Ministers and high functionaries, in order to derive some intelligence from any indiscreet expresion on their part, which he skilfully prometed by flattering their vanity. He was, in reality, incapable of feeling any other love, than that of amilition, and regarded women either in instruments or as playthings. He seemed, in all his relations, to be a downright giddy man, caring but little for serious affairs, and preferring France to his own country. He was not, he said, upon good terms with his Emperor's Minister's because their sympathies were not entirely French, and he often lamented that he was a diplomatist, because he preferred the pleasures of a private station, and because he was too frank and too careless ever to succeed in diplomacy."-London Truth.


