Boston, May 13.—The Journal publishes New Cracked Wheat, an account of an interview with Captain Gripenberg, brother of the commander of Kiln Dried Oatmeal, the Cimbria. He said he came to Boston on official secret business. The only towns in the Russian Empire that the English could attack with their navy were a few places in Finland; but in case the armies of the two countries should come in contact, he believed England would find she had made a mistake.
