A National Policy.

The writer of "Current Events" in the Rose-Belford Canadian Monthly, in the course of an able and impartial discussion of recent speeches by the leaders of the opposing poli tical parties, thus satisfactorily defines the requirements of the country in regard to the

readjustment of the tariff :-"The question which the electorate will be asked to determine-and it is really the only principle at stake-is whether this country is to have a national policy, defensive, not retaliatory, encouraging, not forcing industries which may and can flourish among us? Is Mr. Cartwright's policy discouraging manufactures to prevail any longer, or shall a fiscal scheme suitable to the needs and the environment of the Dominion be inaugurated? With Free Trade or Protection as theories we are not concerned; the issue before the country is pressing, concrete, practical. The Finance Minister not only re uses incidental protection to Canadian industries, but when he might do even a little on their behalf, actually goes out of his way to avoid even the suspicion of a duty which might possibly be of benefit to the community: there betwo articles, one of which can neither be produced, prepared nor manufactured in Canada, and another which may be either or all of these, Mr Cartwright is sure to choose the first for the subject of taxation, even if it be a necessary of life. Now it certainly seems to ordinary common sense that such a policy is simply suicidal, and that no scheme better calculated to stunt the growth, and impede the progress of the Dominion, could possibly be devised. Mr Mackenzie, like most of the school, went back to the Anti-Corn Law Agitation to England, but what analogy can be drawn between the Mother Country in 1845 6 and Canada in 1878? In the former case there were then three factors in the calculation, over-population, an insufficient supply of grain, and established manufactures, fearing no rival. Here we have sparse population, grain is so abundant as to be largely exported, and there are no manufactures in proportion to the resources of the country; and yet the doctrinaire, having found the benefit, at home, of Free Trade in corn, insists upon applying his two foot-rule, where it is absolutely useless or worse. In England, the measure which gave the people cheap bread, may be called Free Trade, if the ring of the phrase pleases any one, but it was in reality a policy which fostered the national industries, as certainly and perhaps

The evening after she has passed her full, on the 15th, she will be in conjunction with the bright evening star, and a charming picture will be painted on the dark azure of the sky.

Mars is also evening star, but is of little account, he is so far away and shines with so insignificant a lustre after the glorious display he made last year, when his glowing aspect turned all the world into star gazers's. He is passing in his superior conjunctions with the sun, reaching this point on the 18th of September, when he will be one hundred and eighty millions of miles farther than at his memorable opposition of 1877, the epoch of the discovery of his two satellities. Mars may be looked for in the constellation Leo, setting now not far from nine o'clock, and not very distant from Regulus. On the 22nd Mars and Morcury are in conjunction. On the 29th those who are fortunate enough to witness the total eclipse of the son will see Mars, Regulus and Mercury forming an irregular line, Mercury being the brightest, and possibly the only one of the starry trio visible during the short

period of total darkness. Saturn, although not classified as an evening star until his opposition on the 22nd of September, rises now not long after eleven o'clock, and at the close of the month may be seen nearly two hours earlier. He is tracking his slow course along the small stars of the constellation Pisces, coming into better position for observation, and may be easily recognized from his superior brightners to the stars in the vicinity, rising also a

little south of east. Venus remains unrivalled among the morning stars. She passed her greatest western clongation on the 2nd of June, and is now speeding far away from us to her superior conjunction on the 5th of December. She rises during the month not very far from two o'clock, and early risers commanding a view of the eastern horizon will be rewarded by a sight of her charming face, and the soft delicate colouring that distinguishes the most beautiful star among the myriads that | make up the starry host. Though far away, and small in size, she retains her sovereign sway, and lingers in the morning sky, till the sun is ready to show his face above the

Mercury, in the first part of the month, is too near the sun to be visible, but, on the 31st he does not set till twenty minutes past eight o'clock, and may, perhaps, be picked up by sharp eyes in the evening twilight, seven degrees south of the place of sunset. On the 28th Mercury and Uranus are in conjunction, and both planets are near Regulus, but a good telescope is needed for a good view of the celestial phenomenon. -Provid ence (R.1.) Journai,
