A Voice-The people in this country want to know how you can increase the industries of the country, without raising the tariff ! Sir John Macdonald-That is a question appropriate, and made evidently by a gentle at heart, and I am glad be has put it, because it brings me from the general remarks was making to the particular question which absorbs the interest of the country : this moment. The gentleman asks me how am I going to protect the various industries Canada without increasing the general

The Same Person-The tariff. tion mean the same thing. The question then is how am I going to protect the industries of Canada without increasing the tariff. [wi'l answer that at once. I say you can protect the industria of Canada, and at the same time not increase the tariff or system of taxation in Canada. (Cheers.) In the tirst place before I address myself to that particular subject, I will tell you that taxaion or the tariff is not to be governed by a system of Protection. Every country has got obligations; every country has got debts, and has to spend money to carry on its administrative affairs. The expenditure each year amounts to a certain sum. The Government must cause that sum to be provided in some way, and this can only be done by taxation by means of the tariff. The Government must effect the expenditure of the year by the taxation, or tariff of the year. If the expenditure is large, you must increase the tariff or taxation; if, by economy, the expenditure is decreased, then you can lower the tariff. And, gentlemen, I say this for the Government of which I was a member while we carried on the Government efficiently; while every department of the alministration was perfect, the laws were honestly and fairly carried out, and the expenditure was not nearly what it has been for the last four years. (Applause.) In every branch public affairs the expenditure of the country has increased since we retired from office, and I appeal to you to say whether, under the present increased expenditure, the affairs of the country are more efficiently carried on than they were from 1867 to 1873. (Cries of "No, no.") Then, gentlemen, if not, I must remind you that you have paid infinitely more for your government since 1873 than before that year. (Hear, hear.) But I am asked, "How can the various industries o this country be protected without an increase. in the amount of tariff or taxation of the country ?" I will tell you, and I want to call your attention to that matter, because it is a point of first-rate and paramount importance, and I speak to you as a plain man speaking to plain men. I am going to use no heteric : I am going to use no figures of speech; I speak to you just as I would if we were sitting in a room talking to one another. ondemned by the doctrinaries of England. The American manufacturies supply the wants of their own forty millions of people at a rate with which the people of nited States are themselves satisfied. So weil satisfied were they, that when an attempt was made at the last meeting of Congress to reduce the tariff, it was defeated by the representatives of the people by an enor mous majority. (Hear, hear.) While the Americans are satisfied to have their high duties, to keep their own supplies for their own people, and to exclude foreign manufacturies by a prohibitive tariff, such a tariff has never been proposed in Canada, and I am not prepared to propose it now, but only reasonable tariff which will sufficiently protect the capital of the country. But what say is this, that the United States people have kept their own country for their manufacturers, and the consequence has been that the manufacturers of the United States, after satisfying the wants of their own people, are at this moment underselling the manufacturers of England at their very headquarters.
