

Opposition to Austrian Occupa-

London, Aug. 5.—A Vienna despatch says the Abend Post (official) publishes the following details of the Austrian occupation

of the Turkish Provinces :--"The main column of the Austrian troops advanced into the valley of Bosnia, after overcoming great difficulties, gaining property owners were especially friendly to the Austrians. As the agitation had at staff, was sent from Derbend on August 1st, received at the entrance of the town with a force an entrance to the town they marched back to Maglai. There the inhabitants, who had previously been friendly to the Austrians, opened a heavy cross fire on the Hussars. The latter were obliged to pass at a rapid pace a defile occupied by armed Bosnians, and in doing so 70 of the Hussars were shot. The remainder reached the Austrian outposts. 
