Daty on Locomotive Engines.

Last year thirty five locomotive engines were imported into Canada from the United States, and were entered for Customs' duty at less than \$6,300 each. Upon \$5,000 duty was charged at 174 per cent, and upon \$1,300 at ten per cent. If the duty had been fairly charged on the actual cost (about \$8,000) of these locomotives, they would not have been imported, as our Locomotive and Engine Works would have made them, and given employment to Canadian mechanics.
