Kingston for the year 1878.

COMMITTEE ROOMS, CITY HALL, / KINGSTON, 29th Aug. 1878. The Committee on Finance and Accounts beg to submit the Estimates for 1878. The Committee have to report that the amount required to be raised by taxation this year to meet the expenditure over the estimated ordinary revenue is \$90,240.66. The Committee report in regard to the increase for the present year over last year, that in 1877 the sale of city property realized the sum of \$10,975, a source of revenue to which the city cannot look this year; and further, that the amounts for the opening of Montreal, Division and Grove Streets, amounting to \$5,640, fall due and must be paid the present year; thus those two items making the sum of \$16,615 more to be pro-

vided for in 1878 than in 1877. The Committee recommend that a tax of 18 mills on the dollar be levied on this year's assessment, \$5,174,605, which will leave a deficiency of \$2,747.77.
