# One Young Lady Shoots Another Because of Unrequited Love.

HER FATHER'S STATEMENT.

Mr Hearn, the father of the murgered girl, makes the following statement :-In the winter of 1875 my daughter Eila and Miss Duer first became acquainted. did not object to the girls associating together at first, knowing, as I did, that Miss Ducr is well educated and intelligent. thought that such an association would benefit both of them. Besides, I admire and respect Miss Duer's father very much. Finally, however, she began to frequent the bouse almost too often, which seemed bother our child. From the fall of 1876 Ella made a strong effort to break off the association altogether. This was, however, in vain Every effort met with the same result There were not six days in the whole year during some time of which Miss Duer was not present in my house, unless, indeed, she happened to be out of town visiting some one in the country. She daily tried to get Ella to walk with her in the woods or remain the kindliest manner, often tell her to go FELIX SHAW'S home and not call again. But this was all to no purpose. THE TRAGEDY. Mr Hearn dictated the subjoined state ment, which he says was made by his daughter to hintself in the presence of others when she had recovered from her state of unconsciousness and was perfectly sound and clear in

November 4 she (Ella) received from Miss Duer a note asking her to go to Miss Duer's house that night, and stating that it was about some important business. She, in company with her younger sister, Louise, Proprietor. House within two minutes' walk GROCERIES for the Winter called that evening at hiss Duer's home. When they arrived Miss Duer tried to peranade Ella to go into the woods the next day for the purpose, as usual, of taking a walk. Ella declined to go. Miss Duer then declared before Almighty God that if she did not go this time she would never ask her to do anything else as long as she lived. November 5, that fatal day, Miss Duer came to our house and insisted that Ella should go into the woods with her. Ella suil declined She then asked Ella to say that she loved her (Miss Duer) more than aryone else. Ella refused to say so. She then, in a state of great excitement, walked from the front door to the gate several times,, and finally went into the passage and shut the door. Walking hurriedly toward Ella, she quickly threw her arms around her and trud to kiss Ella pushed her away, and while so doing Miss Duer slipped and fell. It was but a few seconds after this when the shooting occurred. Miss Duer drew her pistol, cocked

t, and deliberately fired. A FEMALE BIVAL. alleged, supplanted her in Miss Hearn's afections, is Miss Ella Foster, of Pocomoke, a lady of intelligence and highly esteemed.

MISS MEARN S DEATH. MISS PREATE S SICK DOSS WAS LOUIS SUIL . . ceedingly painful. On Saturday a post-mortem examination was made, and the jury of inquest, with the Rev. Wm. Dale as foreman, listened to the following evidence:-

THE TETSIMONY. Dr Quinn testified that the wound would not necessarily produce death, but would depend upon the nervous condition of the person ; thought the ball was the exciting cause ;

Dr Truitt testified that the girl's system had sustained such a shock from the injury that it was impossible to probe for the ball; the ball did not necessarily produce death, Holidays. but was the exciting cause : she died of nervous prestration. The Doctor also testified that he was called in on Tuesday, November k between four and five o'clock; found Miss Hearn sensible but excited; stimulants were necessary, which when given her were the cause of her resting comfortably that night; she remained about three days in that condishe followed Miss Lilly Duer to the door; Miss Duer asked her if she loved her; Miss. Hearn replied playfully, "No;" Miss Duer then drew a pistol and, pointing it at her face near the eyes, said that if she repeated that she would shoot her; Miss Duer then drew back two paces and fired.

Dr Caster testified that there was no evidence of any discase likely to produce death; could not say that the ball was the remo cause of death in this case : it might have


