BRITISH AMERICAN HOTEL The New Heating Apparatus.

Messrs. McKelvey and Birch have just completed the improvement of the heating apparatus of the British American Hote and it is likely to prove a great success. visit to the house, and a tour through the whole building, shows that steam heating apparatus may be fitted up in such a way that there may be an entire absence of the cracking noise which usually accompanies that mode of heating, and also that it may be regulated to any degree of temperature

in any part of the building. The apparatus consists of two boilers (tubular), which are placed in the basement of the building. These have a heating surface of 625 feet. They have cast iron fronts, and have been so arranged as to be capable of running independent of each other, or together. On our visit to the hotel only one boiler was in operation, and this appeared , to be more than sufficient to heat the whole building. One good feature in the arrangemouts is that all the water condensed in the For lower lake region: rising barometer, pipes can be returned to the boilers without fresh to brisk westerly to northwesterly using the pump. There is a steam pump, winds, partly cloudy and colder weather however, which can be used for feeding pur-

> The heat is supplied to the house by main pipes running to each section of the building, and additional space is provided for heating the whole building, when the propose King street extension is erected. The pre sent boiler supply is ample for all the requirements of the house. The system of supply and waste pipes in connection with the apparatus is most ingenious and simple, yet most effective. It would take a more competent engineer than the present writer to describe them, for they must be seen to be understood. Alongside the boilers is a


