Major Holmes' Prize Essay.

(Bread Arrow, Dec. 7.) The Proper Proportion of Artilbry, Field, Siege, and Garrison for the Present Force ! of Active Militia of the Dominion of Ca nada, with suggestions as to its Organisation, Equipment, and Localization.

Major Holmes, Canadian Artillery, adjutant of the School of Gunnery, Kingston, has written a most admirable essay on the above subject, and has deservedly been awarded the first prize by the Dominion Ar tillery Association. The author deals with Thompson, Longfellow, Golden Leaves, his subject in a masterly manner, showing Dodd's Beauties of Shakespeare, not only great ability as a writer, but treat. Sets of Shakespeare in 6 vols., very handing with consummate skill the various questions connected with the militery organisdays of the Canadian forces whilst Imperial troops still garrisoned Canada, Major Holmes alludes to the somewhat capricious manner in which batteries and battalions were then organised --- when a few field batteries were raised in different parts of the country in places as chance led to their formation, without reference to any scheme of defence. Garrison, brigade, and outlying batterice formed irrespective of their actual vie in the event of sudden hostilities, whilst cavalry and infantry were raised and equipped according to the whim and fancy of their commanding officers. 
