Representatives of commercial interests of the great lakes are in Washington contenting that these provisions will have the effect, if ratified and carried into effect, to transer to British owners the monopoly of the carrying trade and the ownership of lake tonnage to British hands, inasmuch as British vessels can be built and sailed at from 30 to 40 per cent less cost i the present condition of the currency and specie taxation than American vessels can be built and sailed; and in view of this fact the United States will gain nothing while giving up their own commerce for the former privilege of entering with American vessels into Canadian ports. It is said the mercantile interests of New York, Boston and Portland are beginning to be moved by the same consideration. 
