DOMINION BOARD OF TRADE.

The second annual meeting of the Dominion Board of Trade was opened yesterday at Ottawa. The report of the Executive Council narrated the events by which was secured the presence of Canadian delegates at St. Louis and American delegates at the present meeting. with a view af obtaining enlarged commercial intercourse between the two countries. The chief topic of discussion was the deepening of the channel of the St. Lawrence, between Montreal and Quebec, in regard to which the Hon. Mr Young and other Montrealers urged that the Board should memoralize the Government to undertake the work. They maintained that it would confer great benefits upon the people of Ontario, as it would cheapen freight, and Mr Young stated that the proposed work would cost a million dollars. Mr H. Fry, of Quebec, seconded by Mr W. H. Howland, of Toronto, moved that the improvement of the Canadian canal system was of much more im. portance than the deepening of the river channel, and in the discussion stated that the latter would cost five millions in order to make it the required depth of twenty four feet. After an animated debate the resolution of Mr Fry was adopted by a vote of eighteen yeas to twelve nays. A resolution, presented by Mr McLennan, seconded by Mr Howland, was at once adopted. It recommended the granting permission to Montreal to form a trust fund in the manner that may be deemed most expedient to make the desired improvement, and to assume the harbour revenues. Col. McGiverin, of Hamilton, was elected President, and Mr Henry Fry, of Quebec. Vice-President of the Board for the ensuing

THE EARL OF KENMARE. - The veneraable of Kenmare, in the British peerage, has just died in Ireland, in his eighty-third third Earl and Viscount Kenmare and Baron Castlerosse, in the peerage of Ireland, and first Baron Kanmare of the United Kingdom. The founder of the family was an English official brought into Ireland as Auditor General, after the reign of James II., whose son obtained his first step on the ladder of rank for services as Surveyor of Forfeited Lands. The earldom was a Union honour, the price of the support of that measure. The Earl was a soldier and saw a good deal of active service in the Peninsula, obtaining the war medal and clasps for Rolica, Ciudad Rodrigo, Badajos and Salamanca. He is succeeded in his title and estates by his eldest son, Valentine, Viscount Castlerosse, now member of Parliament for the country of Kerry, a seat for which becomes vacant by his elevation to the peerage.
