New York, Jan. 26.—A young woman MUSIC AT HENDERSON'S. husband, visited the barber's shop of Geo. F. Watson, in Williamsburg, this morning, and shot the proprietor dead, firing four shots; she and her husband then surrendered themselves. The woman said Watson, by whom she had been employed, was insulting to her, accusing her of unfaithfulness to her husband, and this led her to commit the deed.

Oswego, N. Y., Jan. 25. - About 1 o'clock in the morning of the 24th inst. a fire broke out in a storehouse on West Water street. The building contained about 800,000 shingles, belonging to Smith, Lewis & Co., lumber dealers. A large pile of cedar posts near by was also burned. The flames extended to the timber piles adjacent, and burned half a million or more feet of the fine pine lumber of Smith, Lewis & Co. The fire burned until late in the morning of the 25th, but it is now under control. No further damage is apprehended. Three schooners belonging to Ald. Wheeler lay close to the fire, and it was only by the most strenuous and well-directed efforts that they were saved. There was great danger that the fire would extend further into the lumber district, in which case the loss would have been tremendous. The loss thus far is estimated at \$18,000, and is covered by insurance. The fire was an in-
