Bordeaux Jan. 31 .- The boiler of the British steamship Amazon, which arrived here from Liverpool, exploded yesterday with fatal effect, two men were killed and several injured.

London, Jan. 30.—The impression prevails here that the Geneva Convention will necessarily disappoint the hopes of its friends, and that the end will prove a failure. If the Conference should decide in favour of the claims, no English Government would accept the result and no parliament would vote the money; hence the movement would stop. The proceedings now is considered a pretence. The argument of the Times is that England should demur and claim indirect damages, and if the court reject the demurrer she should withdraw from the case. This is not argument addressed to the government, but it is a government view put out as a feeler. The government says we cannot acquiesce in a construction in which we are determined not to acknowledge if proved against

Paris, Jan. 30.—President Thiers, in discussing with Alphonz Rothschild's project for the further evacuation of France by the Germans, said I would like to see the end of the occupation if we had a stable Government and a settled public opinion. As it is, if the Germans were gone we would have a worse state of affairs. The demagogues and Bonapartists would come forth and in a few days all the calamities of relentless party strife would take place. I will yield, though with regret to the general desire, though I consider that the Prussian occupation is a guarantee of order and peace.
