London, Feb. 3 -- At a meeting in Gal way, Ireland, yesterday, to nominate a can. didate for the House of Commons, the show of hands indicated that the majority of the meeting favoured Nolan, the "Home Rule" candidate. The result of the vote created great uproar, which calumniated in a riot between the opposing parties. The police attempted to suppress the disturbance, when a furious conflict occurred, and many persons seriously injured.

London, Feb. 6.-There is no doubt that the abstract of the Queen's Speech published in the Pall Mall Gazette of last evening was a hoax.

The Times says that the rejection of the Treaty of Washington has become imperative, not being based on perfect understand ing between the parties concerned. It is with the utmost reluctance, says the Times, that we contemplate the possibility that the reference of the claims to a board of arbitration will come to nothing. Our expectation of a successful issue must be extremely moderate. A satisfactory answer from Washington, excluding claims for indirect damages from the case cannot be antici pated, thus establishing a definite under standing, and there can be no sequel but the abandonment of the reference.
