New York, March 11 .- The following additional particulars have been received of Erie revolution. Jay Gould was removed by resolution. Superintendant Bucker and the auditor of the Erie Railway, have recognized General Dix as the President of the company. General Sickles who has been working in the interests of the English stockholders, came to this country and went actively to work with others. In November Cronch went to London and had a consultation with the, foreign stockholders, and urged a combined movement against the ring. When he returned he was closely watched by Gould's detectives, and approached with offers of bribes of any amount if he would work in Gould's interest, and Gould tried to get him to his house. Cronch directed the attention of the Erie ring to Albany, and they were expecting astounding developements there. The good directors of the old board wanted to call a meeting, but Gould. put it off, he tried hard to stave off this meeting, and threatened to throw the road into bankruptcy, and asserted that he would either rule or ruin. Delay after delay took place until at last the present meeting was called by nine of this board. The majority of the members of the board attended the meeting, and the minority staid away under Gould's directions. The new members of the board were kept advised of the movements of Gould and his men, who were in the Erie building. 
