Mr Gladstone said the latter scheme was impracticable, and even American Statesmen were divided in opinion as to its wisdom. He vindicated Home Rule if it converted Fenians so much the better, but he could not but oppose the bill before the House. The motion for the second reading was then rejected-vote, 27 to 145.


