Sir,-The simultaneous meeting in Kingston, of the Episcopal Synod of Ontario and the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Scotland, representative bodies of the two ancient established churches of Great Britain, would present a very favourable opportunity for a graceful and becoming interchange of

Christian courtesies between two sister

The time is happily nearly gone by, as is witnessed by the late evidences of brotherly feeling between these two churches at home, when the Christian sympathics of men-were restricted within the narrow bounds of their own external organization; and a holier spirit is at work, demanding a faller recognition of the common tie of one-ness in Christ Jeans, the "unity of the spirit in the bond of peace." Kingston has, before now, witnessed such manifestations of brotherly love, when bodies of Christian men, met in conference for kindred objects, interchanged cordial greeting, and bade each other God speed in their common work of advancing the kingdom of Christ. Besides refreshing the spirit of those participating in them, such recognitions must powerfully demonstrate to those who contend for an absolute and enforced external uniformity in the Church of Christ, the reality of the vital unity which underlies the surface distinctions of church government, and the differences of opinion regarding minor matters of Christian

expediency, which now seem to divide us ex-Such an idea may have already occurred to some of those chiefly concerned. Should it be carried out, it would gratify not only many adherents of both of these churches, already intimately connected by ties of business* friendship and kindred, but also members of other denominations, who would rejoice to see more fully carried out Christ's test of discipleship-"By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." Permit me, in conclusion, to quote the following admirable words, from a sermon preached by the celebrated Prof. Jewett of Oxford in the Church of Old Greyfriars (Kirk of Scotland).

Edinburgh

"We cannot helpfeeling weary and ashamed of the contentions and divisions which disturb the Christian Church. We meet together in business, in society, in the family, but at the door of the church we part, and that which ought to be the highest bond of union amongst us becomes the most lasting element of discord-'our greatest love turned to our greatest hate. Does any one believe that this separation and antagonism is altogether right?
