Customs Department, OTTAWA; June 18, 1872. CIRCULAR No. 105.

CIR,-Referring to the Act passed in the Precent Session of Parliament, respecting the duties on Tea and Coffee, and providing for the refunding the specific duty paid on stock on hand, I have now, by the desire of the Minister of Customs, to call your atten" tion to the following additional instruc-

1st .- The object of the law is, that the specific duty paid should be refunded on all Tea and Coffee out of bond, and in original unbroken packages, whether in the hands of the original importers or traders, who have purchased them for duty paid.
