GENTLEMEN.—The Elections are close at
hand and it will soon be your privilege as
well as duty to appear at the Polls to record

my opponents to hoodwink and decieve you as
to my vot-es on the subject of the Jerry Re-
serves and electors as well as those Reformers
which are necessary to give the people that
power which had been too long withheld from
them, by the old irresponsible party. It
will be my duty as far as practicable, to
place those vot-es before you, that you may
judge for yourselves whether there has been
anything inconsistent in the course pursued
by me. In the meetings I have had, I have
