Canadian Trade With Jamaica.

Rev. Wm. Murray, a missionary from Jamaica, has been interviewed at Halifax, N.S. He gave a very encouraging account of the progress of that island, and the probability of an extensive trade being opened up between Jamaica and Canada. In future, it seems the Cunard steamers from Halifax will come to touch at St. Thomas, and make Kingston, Jamaica, their port of call. Even now our trade with the island has assumed considerable proportions, but if we can be assured of low freights from this city and other parts of the Province, a greatly extended business might be done at remunerative prices. According to Mr. Murray, Canadian canned fish ought to have a most extensive sale. At present all the canned fish used in the island are brought from England, and cost usually one shilling and sixpence to two shillings for a tin weighing less than a pound. After paying freights, Canadian canned fish ought to do a most profitable business in this line. ## FEDERAL BANK.

A LETTER OF EXPLANATION FROM THE CASHIER.

Some unseasoned but malicious references have been made to the Federal Bank by a Montreal paper. The Cashier publishes the following letter of explanation:

(To the Editor of the Globe) SIR.—Several stupid mis-leading paragraphs having lately appeared in the Montreal Journal, and in reference to the bank, I think it my duty to let the public know the motives which prompted them.

Mr. Foley, the editor and proprietor of the paper referred to, has made repeated applications to this bank to advertise in his paper, and upon a recent refusal by us he threatened that before long he would make use of it to our injury to advertise with him—a clear case of blackmail.

At a later date, upon being again refused, he stated his intention of calling attention to the large amount of business done by us in proportion to our capital, and to the fact that we had no recourse to such contemptible means of increasing its patronage. Mr. Foley is welcome to abuse us to his heart's content. All I ask is that he will confine his remarks to facts, and that he has proved himself incapable of doing.

Oswego Barley Market. The Palladium of the 6th reports the market during the middle of the week was active, and full prices were realized, but towards, and at the close there was comparatively little inquiry at the advanced quotations. The sales for the week aggregate 94,000 bushels, of which for No. 1 bright Canada, 86c to 88c for No. 1, and 82c for No. 2, and these are the nominal figures at the close to-day. Holders generally are not pressing their stock upon the market. The receipts from Canada during the week have been 187,980 bushels, which about closes the receipts for the season. The receipts of new crop barley from Canada to date are 1,007,312 bushels, against 2,857,497 bu. in 1878, 3,883,384 bu. in 1877, 3,014,732 bu. in 1876, 3,966,835 in 1875. Compared with the receipts in 1878 the increase this season is 969,815 bu. The stock of Canadian and State barley in store is over 730,000 bu., which is less than the supply in store a year ago.
