Among the latter Dean Stanley and Mr. Spurgeon have given in their adhesion to it, the latter accession being especially significant in view of the strictures lately pass ed upon the great London preacher by Neil Dow, the author the Maine liquor law. It is a pleasing task to chronicle the growth of temperance sentiment, for upon it undoubtedly depends the improved prosperity and enhanced happiness of

the people.

### IRELAND AND AMERICA-

The United States Congress has been adopting resolutions of condolence with the Irish people and of advice to the British Government in reference to the Irish question. The usual "whereas" refers to the "horrors of famine" with which the people of Ireland are "seriously threatened," and we submit that the practical mode of relieving "the destitution and suffering prevailing and likely to increase" would have been by voting a grant for this purpose instead of, the cheap suggestion to the British Government about the abolition of the land tenure and the landlord injustice. At any rate this latter auggestion would have had much more value in the eyes of Irishmen and much more weight with the Imperial authorities had it been backed up by some practical expression of sympathy. In fact without something of this practical nature to support it the resolution sounds ridiculously like the stereotyped obituary formula of condolence, "Resolved that we cordially sympathize with' the people of Ireland in their present alarming condition from the threatened famine, and in their efforts to obtain relief from the oppressive landlord system. This expression of sympathy will, no doubt, be very grateful to the agitators who are patriotically struggling for the redress of their country's wrongs, but we repeat it would have been still more so had it been accompanied by something mere substantial than mere "resolution" sympathy'.
